#### Is there room?

You may have heard the story about Billy. Billy was big for his age -- seven years old. Everyone wondered what role the teacher would give him in the annual Christmas play. Especially considering the fact that he was also a slow learner. Perhaps he could pull the curtain. To everyone's surprise the teacher gave Billy the role of the innkeeper. The boy of course was delighted. After all, all he had to learn was one line: "There is no room in the inn." He had that down in no time.

Then came the night for the play. The parents took their places. Every seat in the hall was filled. The children entered singing "Oh come all ye faithful." The lights dimmed. A hush moved over the audience. The curtain opened on Scene One. Mary and Joseph entered the stage and walked up to the inn. "Please sir, my wife is not well. Could we have a room for the night?"

Billy was ready for his line. He had rehearsed it all night. He began, "There is..." and he hesitated. He started over again, "There is..." and again his mind went completely blank. Everyone was embarrassed for him, but poor Billy just didn't know what to do. Joseph thought he would improvise and started walking away toward the stable on stage left. Seeing him walking away, Billy called out in desperation: "Look, there's plenty of room at my house, just come home with me."

The important question -- not only at this time of year but all year round -- is, "Do we have room in our lives for Jesus?" Our lives are so busy -- with things that are good and things that are not so good. By the time we've filled our lives with the family or friends, playing golf, tennis or petang, doing the garden, attending lectures, shopping, watching television, our lives are so very crowded. Although many people have come here to retire, it seems that nobody has "spare time" on their hands.

Looking back, we may find ourselves thinking that if the innkeeper had known that Mary was about to give birth to the Saviour of the world, he would have made room. But I'm not so sure. The reason I question that is because I see what happens when we are faced with a question similar to one that was asked of the innkeeper. Jesus wants to know of us, "Do you have room in your life for me?" And I see how often in our busy, hectic lives -- even though we know who Jesus is -- we allow other things to crowd Him out.

This Christmas will we open our hearts to Jesus, or will we allow the busyness of life to crowd Jesus out? The answer we WANT to give is easy, the answer we give by the way we live is sometimes disturbing. May we have a heart that desires to speak with the tenderness of Billy's heart when he said, ""Look, there's plenty of room at my house, just come home with me."

#### **CHRISTMAS MESSAGE 2018**

Travelling over to London on the Eurostar in mid-November, I saw my first Christmas tree of the season. It was a giant silver variety placed prominently on the concourse of St. Pancras Station. And I was reminded that 'the Christmas season' starts earlier in the UK than in most of mainland Europe. And to be sure, this year, the Christmas spirit is sorely needed to boost flagging High Street revenues and give some cheer to those depressed by a seemingly endless Brexit.

Thinking about Christmas, I wondered what would happen if, instead of starting with Matthew, Luke or John we began instead with St. Paul. Paul has no nativity story like Matthew and Luke — indeed he doesn't tell us much about Jesus life at all. However, like St. John, Paul does have his own way of portraying the incarnation. We hear St. John's account of the incarnation at every 9 lessons and carols service, and it is the way he introduces his gospel.

St. Paul's account of the incarnation isn't quite so easy to pin down. But the point at which Paul makes it clearest is, it seems to me, in his Second Letter to the Corinthians. This is one of Paul's later letters, written after Paul has thought very deeply about the Christian faith he proclaims. In a key chapter of this letter, Paul tells us: 'God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation.' (2 Corinthians 5:19)

Like St. John, St. Paul tells us that God became flesh in Jesus Christ. Christ became human. He entered human experience from within and dealt with the barrier that sin had erected between people and God. Where St. John in his prologue talks about people becoming 'children of God', St. Paul describes human beings as becoming a 'new creation'. But what Paul helps us to see particularly clearly is that the purpose of Christ's incarnation is reconciliation. And 'reconciliation' is a word that Paul repeats many times in this important chapter.

So let me be so bold as to suggest that the real, inner meaning of Christmas is reconciliation. Christmastime reminds us that God became human in Jesus to reconcile us to God. And at the same time, God commissioned those who follow Jesus to continue the ministry of reconciliation. In this way, says Paul, we act as ambassadors for God. Reconciliation is God's supreme Christmas gift to the world. And it is a gift meant for sharing.

Now we know that Christmastime does encourage a general sense of bonhomie and camaraderie amongst those of faith and those without. It may be the only time some of us get together with the neighbours or speak informally with those we don't much care for at work. Those small gestures are valuable in themselves. But they point to something much deeper.

'Reconciliation' is a deep and demanding idea. It is to do with bringing people back together again who have fallen out. It is concerned with restoring friendly relationships. Christ's incarnation first of all reminds a sinful and disobedient world that it has a problem with God, and that there is a relationship that needs to be repaired.

Then it challenges those of us who claim to follow Christ to be people of reconciliation ourselves. That is deeply uncomfortable. It means overcoming conflict, forgiving, accepting, welcoming and renewing broken relationships. Actually, this is so difficult that perhaps it is only with God's own help and inspiration that we can do it.

We might start with our families – those with whom most of us will spend most of our time at Christmas. It is in these closest of relationships that conflict is the most painful and reconciliation sometimes the most difficult. Then we might consider our church communities. Could Christmas 2018 be the opportunity to heal and redeem a broken relationship with a Christian brother or sister? And then there are national and international relationships...

At the outset I mentioned Brexit. This is something which within Britain has divided young and old, one region from another, those with strong local allegiances from cosmopolitan folk who have learnt to feel at home anywhere. It has also threatened to divide Britain from its European neighbours. There is a major task ahead to reconcile across these differences. Christians could and should be at the heart of that task.

So this Christmas, I hope that the message of the birth of the Son of God, born to change hearts and minds, to bring people back to God and to empower people to be reconciled with each other is a message that will give us all comfort, encouragement and hope.

I wish each of you and your families a very happy Christmas.

#### **BISHOP'S ADVENT APPEAL 2018**

This year's Advent Appeal is to enable St. Andrew's Moscow to equip their church with a kitchen.

St. Andrew's is committed to the work of reconciliation and the building of trust between peoples. It fulfils this key element of our diocesan strategy in a unique and powerful way. It is not putting it too strongly to say that St. Andrew's Church contributes in a small way to the cause of world peace.

The offering and sharing of hospitality is a key part of the life of many of our chaplaincies. St. Andrew's is no exception. But, at present, food has to be brought in by parishioners or prepared in the parsonage. St. Andrew's would love to be able to prepare food on site.

A kitchen would further St. Andrew's work of reconciliation. It would strengthen church fellowship. And it would be a place in which some of the orphaned young people who are served by St. Andrew's could be taught how to cook. More details are attached to this letter.

We can all appreciate the importance of food and shared meals as means of furthering mission and outreach. I think the installation of a new kitchen is a great idea, which is worthy of our support.

So please do consider how you can support my Advent Appeal, which this year is for St. Andrew's Moscow.

As usual, you can give money to this appeal through your church treasurer, who will forward your gift to the diocesan office.

#### **Bishop's Advent Appeal 2018**

**St Andrew's Anglican Church in Moscow** is an English architectural eccentricity situated 10 minutes' walk from the Kremlin. We are the only clearly identifiable and open British building in the city, especially after the closure of the British Council.

Our prayer is that, in the current political and diplomatic context, we can be a centre of reconciliation, a place where people can be welcomed, meet, listen to each other, and grow in the understanding and respect which leads to trust. We have no political influence, apart from the fact that we are here. Anybody coming into the building walks past both the Russian and UK flag; each week we pray for Her Majesty and for President Putin and their respective governments; and on our communion table where we remember the most costly and wonderful act of reconciliation, we have a symbol of reconciliation: a cross created from nails taken from the bombed and burnt-out cathedral in Coventry. And through the building we are not only able to provide support for English speaking expatriates, but also be a place where Russians and Westerners are able to meet, learn, grow, serve and worship together. We are home to a remarkable school for about 160 young people from orphan or institutional backgrounds who have not attained school leaving certificates, or do not have some of the most basic skills for living, and they are here most evenings of the week (here at their June graduation ceremony).

We are home to an international choir and an English speaking pre-school. We host English and Russian AA and NA groups. Every other Wednesday we provide food parcels for Russian pensioners. Most weeks we have 3 or 4 concerts in the building. Like many chaplaincies we run cultural events which bring Russians and expatriates together: the ubiquitous fetes and bazaars and, for instance, earlier this year an English breakfast and large screen showing of the royal wedding.

While there are no longer political exchanges, our links with the Orthodox Church mean we are in a position to bring over significant church leaders so that there is at least some semi-official dialogue. Lord Chartres, the former bishop of London, is coming in two weeks' time. And each year we have thousands of tourists coming to look at this little piece of England in Moscow.

We would love to be able to extend our ministry of welcome and reconciliation by installing a kitchen. We do a great deal of entertaining, but food is currently either brought in by people mostly on public transport or is prepared in the parsonage. That is not easy when we serve lunch after more than half of our Sunday services, and we are now regularly catering for over 100 people. A kitchen would also be the non-liturgical hub which brings together the different communities who use the building, for preparing meals for those who are most needy, and providing cooking lessons for young people who have spent all their lives in state institutions.

It is not always easy living in a country which, deservedly or undeservedly, is treated as a feared international outcast. Financial sanctions are biting and affect the lives of ordinary people. There are fewer expatriates here now than there have been since the early 1990s. We lost 14 members of our congregation in one week with the diplomatic expulsions. And yet despite that, there is also something incredibly exciting about living on the edge, because it means we have to depend upon the mercy and grace of God. We do not know what to expect from day to day. Russians use the word 'tchuda' to describe a 'wonder', and in daily life when much is unpredictable, we really are dependent on 'tchuda'. And we have seen His provision and guidance. Our congregation has grown significantly; we have about 15 adult confirmation candidates, 2 new readers in training and 1 person who has just left us to start training for ordination at theological college. And God has provided for us in many ways. And so we are immensely grateful to many people for their prayer for us, and to Bishop Robert for suggesting support for St Andrew's and for our proposed kitchen – it is one of those 'tchudas' on which we depend.




#### Scripture Cake

The ingredients and instructions can be found within the Biblical references listed, happy cooking!

#### Ingredients

- 1 ½ lb Judges 5, verse 25 (last clause)
- 2 ½ lb Jeremiah 6, verse 20
- 3 1 tablespoon 1 Samuel 14, verse 25
- 4 3 of Jeremiah 17, verse 11
- 5 ½ lb 1 Samuel 30, verse 12
- 6 ½ lb Nahum 3, verse 12 (chopped)
- 7 2 oz Numbers 17, verse 8 (blanched and chopped)
- 8 1 lb 1 Kings 4, verse 22
- 9 1 level teaspoon 2 Chronicles 9, verse 9
- 10 pinch of Leviticus 2, verse 13
- 11 1 level teaspoon Amos 4, verse 5
- 12 3 tablespoon Judges 4, verse 19



Set oven to warm 160° C / 325° F / gas 3

Cream together 1, 2 and 3· Beat in 4, one at a time, beating well after each addition· Fold in 5, 6 and 7

Sift together 8, 9, 10 and 11 (baking powder) fold into mixture and add 12

Place in a 9 inch diameter greased and lined cake tin, sprinkle with nuts to decorate if desired.

Bake for 11/2 - 2 hours until done.

Allow to cool in tin for 10 minutes then turn out to cool on wire rack Enjoy!
